## It's a New World!

Wow many things have changed since I wrote in our last newsletter. The District Board has been working hard over the last month to accommodate to these changes. First we had our first Zoom meeting which was used to address the international convention being post-poned. These things all happened quickly. I had a District Presidents meeting on March 18 and was told that the International Convention would most likely be post-poned. Also that District 7 had no choice to cancel their convention as a result of restrictions in Canada due to the COVID-19 pandemic. They had no choice. This then affected all the other Districts. Headquarters had a time frame to cancel the International Convention hotel in Norway without a penalty. District Six was one of three Districts that had the potential of losing a lot of money due to our hotel contract. The District Board had an emergency meeting on March 21 to discuss our options. We really had no option, but to post-pone since the International Board had met the day prior and the decision was made to post-pone all conventions to 2022.

In the meantime the District started discussions with the third party company who worked on our behalf to contract the hotel. At first things didn't sound good but by Friday, March 27 we negotiated to reschedule to 2022 with the same hotel. With the commitment to use the hotel in 2022 we wouldn't lose any of our deposit. Tentatively our post-poned convention will be June 2-5, 2022.

So what else have I been doing while on shelter in place? I continue to go to work at a hospital. We have been receiving COVID -19 patients. In addition I work with patients in an outpatient clinic. At our hospital we have dealt with all the same issues as everywhere in the US. It has been stressful and challenging but I look forward to going home and sheltering in place after work. So my time off is very important to me to maintain my sanity. I have been making face masks through the local quilt guild and also masks for the staff I work with. In addition I have been quilting, reading, weeding, cooking and working on projects for the Sons of Norway convention 2022. See my recommended reading list for Shelter-in-Place.

The District Board continues to work via Zoom meetings as does the Rec Center Board. The District Board is preparing a Biennial report so we can share an update of what the district has done over the last 2 years. In addition all aspects of the District, maybe in a different way but still we are here to support and assist lodges. I have to say I have been reading your lodge newsletters and there have been some really creative and fun solutions by lodges on how to still communicate, and actively meet with members via electronic means. At the last District Board meeting we had a virtual "Happy Hour".

I look forward to hearing from you, seeing you on a Zoom meeting or better yet when we can all meet together as a fraternal family. And I hope I don't have to wear a mask in 120 degree weather this summer in the desert.

#### "Times, They are A-changin'!"

Why do I say that? Well, as we are all aware, with the pandemic spreading throughout the world, life has also changed within the Sons of Norway. Most of the staff is working remotely at least part-time. **IT** has become critical to keep everything running smoothly. However, even before the pandemic began attracting our attention there was change afoot. Let us review!

The Staff at Headquarters has been in flux for about two years now. A Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and Chief Operational Officer (COO) were hired to serve along with the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). As these two new positions were formed and established, the expertise these new folks brought to the table also meant the hiring of new personnel in their departments.

Erika Oberg, our CFO, updates the International Board at each meeting. She has a long history working in the field of non-profit/financial benefits organizations. She oversees the regulatory and compliance areas plus the Business Continuity. In other words, great responsibilities but she is up to it!

Chris Pinkerton, who was hired as our COO, began making significant changes in the way Sons of Norway does business. He has an extensive background as CEO of other Fraternal Benefit Societies. With the aging of our members and decline in lodge memberships, he instituted new (to Sons of Norway) methods of recruiting/training Agents to increase sales and decrease costs. With our New Insurance Members number on pace to outdistance our 2020 goal, we can see that the strategies are working. New IPs (Insurance Professionals, formerly called Financial Benefits Counselors FBCs) are being hired and assigned on a routine basis through extensive marketing. On March 13, 2020 Chris was announced as the new CEO of Sons of Norway due to a restructuring of the Administrative Staff. His position as COO was eliminated.

On the Foundation side, Anne Olson was hired as the new Director this Spring. She is working diligently on Fundraising and Marketing while guiding the Foundation Board of Governors in ways to mitigate the effects of convention postponements which affect foundation awareness and fundraising.

Some even more exciting and positive news for the Sons of Norway future:

- Building Heritage Membership is getting a new push. Recognition patches for 5,10- and 15-year membership have been developed. New Heritage Members receive a personalized Welcome Kit and a new *Viking for Kids* is in the works. This publication is part of the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration and will be published on the Sons of Norway website and available for download, hopefully, on my 75<sup>th</sup> birthday, August 3, 2020.
- International is recommending video conferencing options for lodge leaders to explore how to replace inperson meetings and gatherings during the COVID-19 pandemic. Check out: Zoom, Skype, Amazon Chime, Google Hangouts, Face Time and GoToMeeting. It's really great fun to see one another's faces again.
- Sons of Norway will be moving back to 1455 W. Lake Street into the new building in June 2020. There have been significant delays (when aren't there in construction and especially right now?) but everyone is cheerfully readying to pack up and head back to downtown Minneapolis.

## **District Six Education Fund**

Prior to the District Six Convention in June 2016, the District Six Scholarship Fund of approximately \$80,000 was in a separate "Passbook Savings" account that was in a Wells Fargo Branch Bank in the Headquarters Sons of Norway Building in Minneapolis, Minnesota drawing minimal interest. But, in 2016 things changed and the District Six Convention voted overwhelmingly to transfer a major portion (5/8ths of the \$80,000 District Scholarship Fund, i.e. \$50,000) to establish the "District Six Education Fund" at the Sons of Norway (SON) Foundation.

2016 was also the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the SON Foundation. That year Carl Peter Ingvoldstad, a past member of the SON Foundation Board of Governors, was appointed the District Six Foundation Director, while continuing as Chairperson, District Six Scholarship Committee.

The idea of transferring the scholarship fund to the SON Foundation was the culmination of six months of discussion and planning with Carl Peter, then District President Mary Beth Ingvoldstad and Treasurer Bob Sather, along with the then SON Foundation Director Corrie Maki Knudson. At the District Convention a resolution (prepared by Carl Peter) was introduced to establish the District Six Educational Fund and transfer \$50,000 to the SON Foundation.

According to the 2016 District Six Convention Report Book: The concluding remarks prior to the vote on Resolution #12, International President Jon Tehven helped "seal the deal" when he mentioned—"the safety of the money invested (in the Foundation)." He concluded with this statement: "Remember this—an endowment <u>is for good and it is forever"</u>.

District Six then voted to establish their Educational Fund within the SON Foundation and on June 1, 2017, when all legal documents were approved, \$50,000 was transferred. On December 31, 2019 the District Six Scholarship Fund had grown to over **\$90,241** while the remaining amount in the old District Six Scholarship Fund account has stayed at **\$30,000**.

When asked what advice he would give to other Districts considering transferring funds to the SON Foundation, Carl Peter offered this:

Hold discussions between SON Foundation Director, District President, Treasurer, Scholarship Chair and the District Foundation Director.

Develop a comprehensive transfer plan:

Target an initial transfer of \$50,000, which is the Foundation's required initial amount Prepare a Resolution to present to the District Convention Establish realistic fundraising goals and strategies for the next 3-5 years

The District Six Treasurer recently predicted that the ultimate goal of \$100,000 could be reached by June 2020.

## MESSAGE TO: ALL MEMBERS OF SONS OF NORWAY, DISTRICT SIX

### RE: COVID-19 Crisis and Upcoming 2020 Conventions CLARIFICATIONS

Greetings All,

Based on the questions coming into the District Six Officers, some of the information we sent out recently is not clear. We hope the following will help your understanding.

• The 2020 District Six Lodge Meeting & Convention in Mesa, Arizona is postponed until 2022 as per the decision of the International Board of Directors.

• Terminology – The District Six Lodge Meeting is the business part of the Convention. The extra activities such as workshops or seminars, the Folk Art Exhibition & Competition, the Recreation Center Board Meeting, meals and social time, vendors, etc. are also part of the convention. Often, to simplify, the word 'convention' is used to mean the District Six Lodge Meeting and Convention

- The International Lodge Meeting and Convention is postponed until 2022.
- Local lodges shall comply with any local, state, and federal guidelines for meeting.

• The 2018 <u>district delegates</u> remain as delegates until the district convention in 2022. They will act on any referenda brought forth by the District Board of Directors. The 2018 alternates will take the place of any 2018 delegates not able to continue their service.

• The District Board is likely to present referenda during this biennium, as there are a couple of district related resolutions that the board would like to act on before 2022. Delegates may also be called upon to approve various reports via referendum, so that the 2022 delegates are not reviewing reports and financials from 2018 and 2019.

• The 2018 <u>international delegates</u> remain as delegates until the international convention in 2022. They will act on any referenda brought forth by the International Board of Directors. The 2018 international alternates will take the place of any 2018 international delegates not able to continue their service.

• All <u>district and international officers and directors</u> for the 2018-2020 biennium will continue in service until the regular district lodge and international lodge meetings of 2022. Those not wishing to continue may submit a resignation letter. Procedures in the Charter and Constitutions allow the district and international boards to make replacement appointments from among the 2018 delegates.

This COVID-19 crisis has put us in uncharted territory and uncertainty, but we have an organizational structure to move forward. In the face of these unsure and daunting times, we can share our heritage and care for each other through phone calls, social media, lodge newsletters, emails, etc. When we get through this crisis, we then can gather together as lodges, boards, committees, and other entities once again, perhaps with more enthusiasm and thankfulness.



If you are already working on a project for the next District Six convention, try to complete it.

#### PLEASE NOTE:

Since there will not be a District Six convention in 2020, you will have another 2 years to complete projects for exhibit and or competition at the 2022 District Six convention.,

#### 4 years in total.

The 8th of May is Liberation Day, marking the end of Norway's occupation during World War II. We take a look back at what happened, and how the day is marked today. Liberation Day, known in Norwegian as Frigjøringsdagen, is marked every year in Norway on the 8th of May. It also serves as Norway's Veterans Day. It marks the anniversary of 8 May 1945, when Nazi Germany forces withdrew from Norway and WWII came to an end. The occupation had begun on 9 April 1940, so Norway had been occupied for more than five years.

The 17th of May, "Syttende Mai" is Constitution Day, marking the day that the Eidsvoll Assembly signed the Constitution, signaling its independence and separation from Sweden, in 1814. Whilst many countries celebrate their national day with a military parade, Norway's 17 May is more of a party for everyone, especially the children. Before they take to the streets, many will gather for a 17 May breakfast – often a potluck with friends and neighbors – with freshly baked bread, scrambled eggs, smoked salmon, and for the grown-ups, champagne. Children's parades then take place across the country, and led by marching bands they walk through their communities. The largest of the traditional

parades attract tens of thousands of people waving flags and shouting "hurra!". In Oslo, the parade is greeted by the royal family who are waving tirelessly to the crowds from the Royal Palace balcony. Hot dogs and ice cream are the traditional foods of the day!





## THE FIRST HUNDRED AND TEN YEARS OF SAN FRANCISCO'S HENRIK IBSEN LODGE #7, SONS OF NORWAY

Part One: At the beginning......\*



In 1849, a booklet was published in Christiana, Norway (now Oslo) called: <u>An Account of California and</u> <u>its Riches of Gold</u>. Within only a few weeks, the first Norwegian immigrants to California set sail for San Francisco to seek their fortunes in the gold diggings. Only one of them, Capt. Christian Poulsen of Grimstad, struck the proverbial jackpot. Many of his Norwegian compatriots, though, decided to remain in California, rather than return to Norway

---and prospered as craftsmen, carpenters, fishermen and seamen. Undaunted by vigilante violence and the major earthquakes of 1868 and 1906, they invited their friends and relatives to join them in a city of unparalleled beauty, benign climate and rich economic opportunities.

By 1890, there were 3000 Norwegians in the San Francisco Bay Area. Much as they wanted to become Americans, they also wanted to preserve the culture and the traditions of their homeland. So, they decided to create an association which would not only provide a social community, but also an organization to protect them in times of sickness or economic hardship. Several failed attempts were made to start a Norwegian association in San Francisco. But with the announced 1906 arrival in San Francisco of polar explorer Roald Amundsen, the Norwegian community was galvanized into forming a Lodge to help plan gala celebrations for Amundsen and his crew---to honor their "discovery" of the Northwest Passage aboard the GJØA. Just before the ship's scheduled entry through the Golden Gate, the 1906 Earthquake struck. The Amundsen festivities (as well as the founding of a new Norwegian group) were forgotten for the timebeing, as members of the local community worked to find new homes for each other, and to build a new city. One unex-



pected benefit from the disaster was the decision of at least one member of Amundsen's

crew to settle in San Francisco, and eventually join what would become Henrik Ibsen Lodge.

According to early Lodge minute books, he crafted the exuberant "shadow box" ship's model

of the GJØA, with an American shield and Norwegian flag, which now hangs in the Kitchen at

Henrik Ibsen Park.

What do you do when the average winter temperature is below freezing and the sun only shines few hours per day? You utter words to illicit smiles and get outside, of course. From Norway, the land of elaborate-Iv knitted sweaters and mischievous trolls, comes-get ready to chuckle -Barnelopet (pronouced "BARN-uh-LOH-pit"), a winter ski race just for the wee ones. The funny word makes me think of farm animals loping toward the barn to get the heck out of the cold in a Jan Brett picture book, and maybe that's exactly where it comes from. It's Norwegian for "kids race."

Barnelopet is a worldwide phenomenon traditionally hosted by chapters of Sons of Norway. Vestafjell Lodge #6-164, has hosted the race

for many years, on the world's longest flat-topped mountain, Grand Mesa in western Colorado, with the perfect combination of elevation, climate and terrain to produce world-class Nordic skiing, we thought our munchkins-on-skis deserved Barnelopet as part of their cultural heritage. It was a chance for kids to dream about professional ski racing, like our own twotime Junior National Champion Hailey Swirbul used to do. Mostly, it was just plain fun.

Currently, and for the past several years, Zone 8 (SofN Lodges in eastern Colorado) has hosted the event at Snow Mountain Ranch "YMCA" in Granby, in January of each year, and the lodge in Grand Junction, with help from grants awarded by Sons of Norway, hosts a "Skate-Barnelopet".

"SKATE BARNELOPET" is also "tons of fun"! A brainstorm of Vestafjell member, Linda Lynch, this is a "race" held in March of each year at the Glacier Ice Arena in Grand Junction.

Lessons are included for ages 4-14, skate rentals are free, and everyone wins a medal! The attendance is growing every year, and it is one of the winter events enjoyed by all aqes in the community. A wonderful outreach with a Norwegian tradition!


#### **Social Distancing Not Social Isolation**

The coronavirus virus (COVID-19) pandemic has changed our daily lives and the way we do things. While it is important to practice *social distancing*, and it may be for some time to come, it is important to not become *socially isolated*. District Six, and many of our lodges, have already adopted the Zoom video conferencing system. There have been board/ officer meetings, virtual happy hours, cultural presentations, and even family gathering being conducted by Zoom throughout the District.

The Social Media Support Committee (SMSC) can provide help with Zoom if you need it. There are several other such systems, and you can choose the one that works best for you. As we have done with other technology, the SMSC has identified what we think is a good solution and can offer support for that solution.

To get the most out of Zoom, it is best to use a computer, tablet, or smart phone that has a camera, microphone, and speaker(s). This is the set up you should have to host a Zoom meeting. You can use this same setup to join a Zoom meeting, or you can use any phone to call in for an audio only connection.

It is easy to get started with Zoom, using any browser, visit the Zoom website (<u>https://zoom.us/</u>), scroll down to the bottom and click on the Download link:

This will allow you to test your internet connection, camera, microphone, and speakers.

In order to host a meeting, you will need to sign up for a Zoom account (click on the orange button on the Zoom website). The free account will allow you to host a meeting of up to 100 people, but your meeting length will be limited to 40 minutes. If you must have longer meetings, you can purchase a Pro license for \$14.99/month. While it is only necessary for the host to have a zoom account, others may want to sign up for a free account so they can host virtual family gatherings.

Zoom offers lots of support and you can find many of their help videos by clicking "SUPPORT" on the main menu of the Zoom website. If you need other help with Zoom, fill in the SMSC Help Request form on the District Six website (<u>https://sofn6.org/smsc-help/</u>).

Zone 8 Director Bev Moe


