

the century club reimagined!

As many may have heard, the Century Club retired earlier this year. The Century Club was formed back in 1996 to provide much needed funds to support the ongoing maintenance at Camp Norge. The Century Club operated as its own entity and was formed out of a love for the camp. When the Century Club retired, members of the Recreation Center Board stepped up, recognizing the importance and value of the Century Club, and decided to form a committee under the Recreation Center Board so that the legacy of the Century Club could live on. This new committee will be taking on a larger role within the Recreation Center Board as the fundraising committee to help support Camp Norge.

Over the last few months, the committee has formed with six members who bring unique skill sets ranging from finance to fundraising to neuroscience. Several of the committee members grew up attending the youth heritage camps at Camp Norge or have kids who attended, which helped develop a deep love for their Norwegian heritage. This new committee brings a strong passion for the well being of the camp, and they look forward to honoring the groundwork that was laid out for them while also breathing new life into fundraising ideas. "Let it flour" fundraiser

We know the weather is getting warmer and the West is experiencing yet another drought. During this past season, Camp Norge literally ran out of water FOUR times. The camp's primary source of water is a beautiful spring on the mountain above the property. But during drought conditions like we have been seeing more and more, the spring slows to a trickle. When this happens we end up having to turn off the water running to bathrooms, kitchens and campsites. Which means we have to cancel events.

This has happened in the past. That's why 20 years ago, we created a backup plan and dug a deep well located in the meadow. But our 20-year-old well pump is all worn out. We urgently need to replace the pump and add a new storage tank in order to protect us from having to cancel events this coming season. The new system will cost us \$15,000. That sounds like a lot of money, but it is a fraction of what the camp stands to lose if we have to cancel rental groups who keep our revenue flowing.

That's where YOU come in. We need water to flow, even when the drought causes the mountain spring to dry up. With your support, we can bring our water system up to date. But we need the funds no later than March 1st so we can be ready for the 2022 season. This "Let It Flow" campaign will only run through the end of February. How can you help? Hardanger Embroidery

To earn the first level for a Cultural Skills pin in Hardanger you need to demonstrate some of the 7 basic stitches used in Hardanger. This requires more time than allotted at Camp Oldfjell. The instructor for Hardanger was Nancy Madson (L), and her students were Joyce Morken (R: left) and Mary Beth Inqvoldstad (R: right).



CAMP OLDFIELL COOKING CLASS

This recipe for Kvæfjord Cake, aka the world's best cake, was prepared by the 2021 Camp Oldfjell Cooking Class. Mary Beth Ingvoldstad, was the instructor, and her assistant was Kris Andre-Stocker. They taught Karen Nichols, Craig Dill, Ronald Dill, Jodi Nelson, Judy Purrington, Earl Fuchs, and Jana Peterson. The cooking class was very ambitious, making twelve recipes during Camp Oldfjell's four days. The class shared their masterpieces with all of the Camp Oldfjell attendees. The cake was especially popular, Teri Morken took pictures of the cake and by the time she put her camera away, it was all GONE! Five members of the cooking class received a Cultural Skills pin, a skill bar, and a level 1 bar. Three others also received the cooking skill bar and a level 1 bar. Everyone except Jodi Nelson, who only attended 2 of the 4 days, also received their level 2 bars. Mary Beth and Kris also earned their Mentor pins and bars for levels 1 and 2.

KVÆFJORD CAKE

½ cup margarine

½ cup sugar

4 egg yolks

⅔ cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

3-4 tablespoons milk

4 egg whites

1 cup sugar

3 ½ tablespoons chopped almonds

1 (4oz) package rum or Vanilla pudding mix

1 ¼ cups whole milk

1 ¼ cups whipping cream

Preheat the oven to 350°F

Beat margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the egg yolks, one at a time. Sift the flour with the baking powder and add alternately with the milk. Pour into a greased 8x12" pan. Beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually add the sugar and beat until stiff and glossy. Spread over the cake



batter. Sprinkle with almonds. Bake 20-25 minutes. Cool and halve. Prepare the pudding according to the package directions, but use only 1 ¼ cups milk. Chill. Whip the cream and fold into the pudding. Spread one cake layer with cream, then top with the other cake layer.

Fill your party bags with festive goodies. Make a fold about halfway down and tuck in a little on both sides to make the shape of the face.


Glue an antler inside the fold on each side of the bag.

Glue on the nose


After the glue has dried, you can share your goodie bags with your family and friends!
