2024 Convention Highlights

At the 2024 convention, a key takeaway emerged during our breakout lunch about marketing our lodges. Our Zone 2 delegates agreed the presentations were informative, but most of our lodges lack the resources to implement many of the suggested actions due to limited personnel and an aging membership.

Key solutions discussed included:

- 1. **Collaborative Marketing**: Forming a Zone 2 committee with representatives from each lodge to tackle marketing strategies collectively, using shared resources.
- 2. **Joint Events**: Collaborating across Zone 2 lodges for events like lutefisk dinners, where we could pool resources and manpower. Jointly hosted "Zone 2 events" were also proposed.
- 3. **Cross-Promotion**: Sharing ideas and presentations between lodges to foster membership growth and engagement.
- 4. **Competitions for Engagement**: Introducing friendly competitions between lodges to boost participation, such as event attendance, volunteering hours, or new member recruitment.
- 5. **Communication Improvement**: Addressing communication issues by considering a centralized Zone calendar to prevent scheduling conflicts and improve coordination.

Moving forward, improving communication will be key to addressing many of the challenges we face. As discussed during the convention and in subsequent conversations, the wide range of communication tools used by our members—email, social media, phone calls, and traditional newsletters—often leads to miscommunication and scheduling conflicts. To tackle this, we could create a centralized, online calendar for our Zone or include all of the Northern California lodges. This would help with preplanning events and avoid overlapping schedules, ensuring that our members can support multiple activities without conflict. By standardizing our communication efforts, we can strengthen collaboration, boost attendance, and enhance the overall experience for all members.

Continued informal talks have reinforced the importance of better communication and collaboration to strengthen our lodges.

Solheim Lodge #6-069 (Zone 2)

Stockton's Solheim Lodge enjoyed a special program in August. Dale Goodman from the Vesterheim Museum presented his visual program on The Restauration for us. It was an amazing story of truly hardy people! The Restauration took 52 passengers on a 98-day journey from Stavanger, Norway, to New York City. The presentation followed the story from its roots in the Napoleonic Wars, through the voyage itself, the reception in New York City, and finally to the first Norwegian settlement in the United States. It was a small sloop, 54 feet long and 16 feet broad, and should have had no more than 16 passengers. There was even a baby born during the voyage. Probably the cask of wine they found floating helped! When they arrived in New York, the captain was fined because only 16 passengers should have been on that size ship. They had to sell the sloop to pay the fine. But all survived and stayed in America.

We had a good number of guests that enjoyed the program and our Norwegian goodies. It was also special to meet Dale Goodman's family from Lodi.

2025 marks the 200th Anniversary of the first organized emigration of Norwegians to the United States. The single mast sloop, Restauration, left Stavanger July 4, 1825, with 52 people on board. Often referred to as the "Sloopers," they arrived in New York City harbor October 9, 1825. The coordinated undertaking for the 200th anniversary has been identified as "Crossings, Norway & North America, 1825-2025," and is managed by a group of dedicated professionals representing numerous organizations that include the Norwegian American Historical Association (NAHA), Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum, Norway House, The Norwegian American newspaper, with representation from Sons of Norway and the Sons of Norway Foundation.

Sons of Norway Involvement: Sons of Norway lodges and other cultural organizations and educational institutions have an opportunity to partner to create exceptional, entertaining, and memorable programming in recognition of this anniversary. It should be noted that 2025 is being referred to as a commemoration, not a celebration: immigration brought opportunities to new arrivals, but also negatively affected existing nations.

Sons of Norway Foundation: The SofN Foundation has made a financial contribution to assist in the communication efforts for Crossings as this milestone is beneficial to many of our lodges. Now is the time for Sons of Norway lodges to consider their options, potential partners, and begin planning for 2025. The Sons of Norway Foundation grants and scholarships program is a funding resource for lodge projects and programs. Grants reach grassroots communities across the county and Norway, and scholarships bolster education and cultural exploration domestically and internationally. 2025 projects related to the 200th anniversary will be given preference for grants. Sons of Norway Recognizes a Rising Star

In 1950 the Mills Brothers recorded "Daddy's Little Girl." Nothing could be truer than the young woman who took all the marbles this year in the Sons of Norway Scholarship competition.

Jenna Becker received a Vegas Viking Scholarship for \$650, and the District Six scholarship for \$2,000. It is the first time a local student has won both scholarships. One of the evaluators said her application "was the best application he's ever evaluated."

Just applying for scholarships was not her only exposure to the Sons of Norway. Her mother, Kim, serves on the Marketing Committee of the Vegas Vikings Lodge 6-152, and Jenna developed several promotional posters for the Lodge. In her scholarship application, she noted that she plans to continue her SofN activities by taking her interest in art and architecture to study abroad. In addition to contributing flyers for the Vegas Vikings, her art has been shown at Las Vegas Art in the Park and the Las Vegas Summerlin Festival of the Arts.

She has won Hederspris Outstanding Sports Achievement Award, and the Idrettsmerke Sports Hero Medal, both from the local lodge

Now she is off to Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill. where she received several additional scholarships including an art scholarship, her major, and for softball, the reason to go there in the first place. She will major in art with a minor in psychology. Why Augustana College "I liked the coach and his philosophy in teaching the fundamentals of the sport," she said.

Jenna's other high school sports activities and recognitions stretch the length of a very long arm. They include the Heisman High School Scholarship, NI-AA All-State Academic tennis team, Nevada Preps All-Southern Nevada Softball Team, All-league First Team Softball (two years), National Fast pitch Coaches Association All-America Scholar Athlete, Dorall Academy Red Rock Varsity Softball Player of the year (two year) and many more.

"My goal was to have my first year's tuition paid for before stepping on the campus," Jenna said with confidence. "I also received a lot of scholarship of-

fers that I won't be able to use because I didn't select any of those schools." In fact there were either applications to or offers from 24 schools across the country.

Her community service work included collecting eyeglasses for the Lions Insight Foundation, Kids' Food Basket, Arthritis Foundation, and Arthritis National Research Foundation's Be Strong Nevada State Representative.

And if all that wasn't enough, she was on the National Honor Society, held several positions in student government, including serving as a mentor to students and an intermediary in problem resolutions..

When asked where she sees herself 10 or 20 years from now, she replies with all the confidence of a success story. "I want to be happy. I know I will be successful."

Now what about Daddy's Little Girl? Her father, Richard, has been an assistant coach her entire softball career, starting in elementary school. Their next big road trip will be when he drives her to Augustana College in late August.

Daddy's little girl is now all grown up!

9 Facts About Social Security

Social Security has been a fact of retirement life ever since it was established in 1935. We all think we know how it works, but how much do you really know? Here are nine things that might surprise you.

- 1. The Social Security trust fund is huge. It was \$2.8 trillion at the end of 2022. [1]
- 2. Most workers are eligible for Social Security benefits, but not all. For example, until 1984, federal government employees were part of the Civil Service Retirement System and were not covered by Social Security. [2]
- 3. You don't have to work long to be eligible. If you were born in 1929 or later, you need to work for 10 or more years to be eligible for benefits. [3]
- 4. Benefits are based on an individual's average earnings during a lifetime of work under the Social Security system. The calculation is based on the 35 highest years of earnings. If an individual has years of low or no earnings, Social Security may count those years to bring the total years to 35. [4]
- 5. There haven't always been cost-of-living adjustments (COLA) in Social Security benefits. Before 1975, increasing benefits required an act of Congress; now, increases happen automatically, based on the Consumer Price Index. There was a COLA increase of 3.2% for 2024, but there was an increase of 8.7% in 2023. [5]
- 6. Social Security is a major source of retirement income for 67% of current retirees. [6]
- 7. Social Security benefits are subject to federal income taxes but it wasn't always that way. In 1983, Amendments to the Social Security Act made benefits taxable, starting with the 1984 tax year. [7]
- 8. Social Security recipients received a single lump-sum payment from 1937 until 1940. One-time payments were considered "payback" to those people who contributed to the program. Social Security administrators believed these people would not participate long enough to be vested for monthly benefits. [8]
- 9. In January 1937, Earnest Ackerman became the first person in the U.S. to receive a Social Security benefit a lump sum of 17 cents. [8]

While social security payments may cease when a spouse passes away, life insurance proceeds can soften the blow of a reduced income for the surviving spouse. 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- 1. What is the Sons of Norway Foundation? The Sons of Norway Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit charitable organization. This means that financial donations to the Foundation are fully income-tax deductible.
- 2. When was the Sons of Norway Foundation established? The Sons of Norway Foundation was established in 1966.
- **3.** What is the mission of the Sons of Norway Foundation? The mission of the Sons of Norway Foundation is to celebrate Nordic culture and heritage through scholarships and grants to our members and communities.
- **4.** How are the scholarships established? The scholarships are established by individuals, lodges, and districts who donate financial resources to the Sons of Norway Foundation to endow scholarships. Once the financial donation is made and the terms of the scholarship are agreed upon, the financial donation(s) is then invested.
- 5. What is an 'endowed' scholarship? An endowed scholarship is funded by financial resources donated for a charitable purpose, such as a scholarship fund. The financial resources are invested in an endowment fund and only the interest on these investments is used to fund the scholarship. Once the endowment has been established, the donor no longer has any control or rights to the donated funds. Those who donate their financial resources to an endowed scholarship do, however, determine the criteria for the scholarship.
- **6.** Who is eligible to receive a Sons of Norway Foundation Scholarship? Applicants must be a current Sons of Norway member or a child or grandchild of a current Sons of Norway member. There are a few scholarships that accept applications from non-members.
- 7. Scholarships awarded 2021 2024 2021 29 scholarships awarded \$111,799 2022 37 scholarships awarded \$133,000 2023 38 scholarships awarded \$160,000 2024 33 scholarships awarded \$147,820
- **8.** Where do I find information about Sons of Norway Foundation Scholarships? Sons of Norway Foundation scholarship information can be found at www.sofn.com, the Sons of Norway website. Click on the "Foundation" tab and scroll down and click on "Scholarships." Scholarships are open for application starting October 1.
- **9.** What are Sons of Norway Foundation Grants? There are six Sons of Norway Foundation Grants: 3 for Heritage and Culture and 3 for Humanitarian purposes.
- **10.** Heritage and Culture Fund Grants: Heritage and Culture grants are for projects that promote and preserve the Nordic culture and heritage, and to "give lodges a boost" in their operating budget that they would not likely receive from other sources.

11. Humanitarian Fund grants: Humanitarian Fund grants are to establish educational programming and/or mentoring for children, or to provide financial support for members whose homes are significantly damaged and are deemed unlivable for a period of time due to a natural disaster, or to provide assistance to members experiencing severe financial hardship from extreme medical illness or personal injury. To receive the natural disaster and medical Humanitarian Fund grants, the applicant must be a current Sons of Norway member.

13. How are Sons of Norway

Foundation Grants funded? The Sons of Norway Foundation grants are funded through generous donations from our members and lodges. Donors may direct a gift to a specific fund, such as the Humanitarian Fund, or not designate and the donation will go to a general fund which can be used for other grants.

- 15. How is the Sons of Norway Foundation governed? The Sons of Norway Foundation is governed by the Foundation Board of Governors whose terms, duties, and responsibilities are stated in their Bylaws. There is the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and at-large members. Because of its close relationship to Sons of Norway, the International Chair can appoint members to the Foundation Board of Governors. Members of the Foundation Board of Governors serve without pay; however, expenses are paid.

- 17. What are the assets of the Sons of Norway Foundation? As of December 31, 2023, the assets of the Sons of Norway Foundation were \$11,686,356.
- 18. What is the relationship between the Sons of Norway and Sons of Norway Foundation? The Sons of Norway Fraternal Benefit Society is a 501(c)(8) insurance company that administers insurance and annuity products for our members. They also administer the Fraternal (heritage and culture) benefits, such as the Viking Magazine. The Sons of Norway Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit charitable organization. The Sons of Norway Foundation is financially independent of the Sons of Norway Fraternal Benefit Society.
