Communication Builds Stronger Lodges

The Communications Awards recognize far more than newsletters. Every way your lodge communicates makes a difference. Whether you maintain a website, post regularly on social media, send emails, make phone calls, publish public service announcements, or remember members with birthday, get-well, and sympathy cards, each effort helps strengthen your lodge and keeps members informed and engaged.

This year, we also recognized the dedicated individuals who work behind the scenes to ensure members stay up to date on district news, lodge activities, and upcoming events. Your time, creativity, and commitment are appreciated more than you know.

In May, District Six introduced PhotoCircle, a simple app that allows lodge members to upload photos directly into a shared online album called a Circle. It's an easy way to preserve memories, showcase your lodge's activities, and provide a collection of photos that can be used in newsletters, on social media, and other promotional materials. Best of all, these images help introduce prospective members to the fellowship and fun that make Sons of Norway so special.



Not every lodge has started using its Circle yet. Ask your lodge leadership to share an invitation to your lodge's Circle and start uploading your photos. Every member can help tell the story of your lodge. Share pictures from meetings, cultural programs, Camp Norge, district events, and community activities with friends and family. A picture is often the best invitation to become involved.

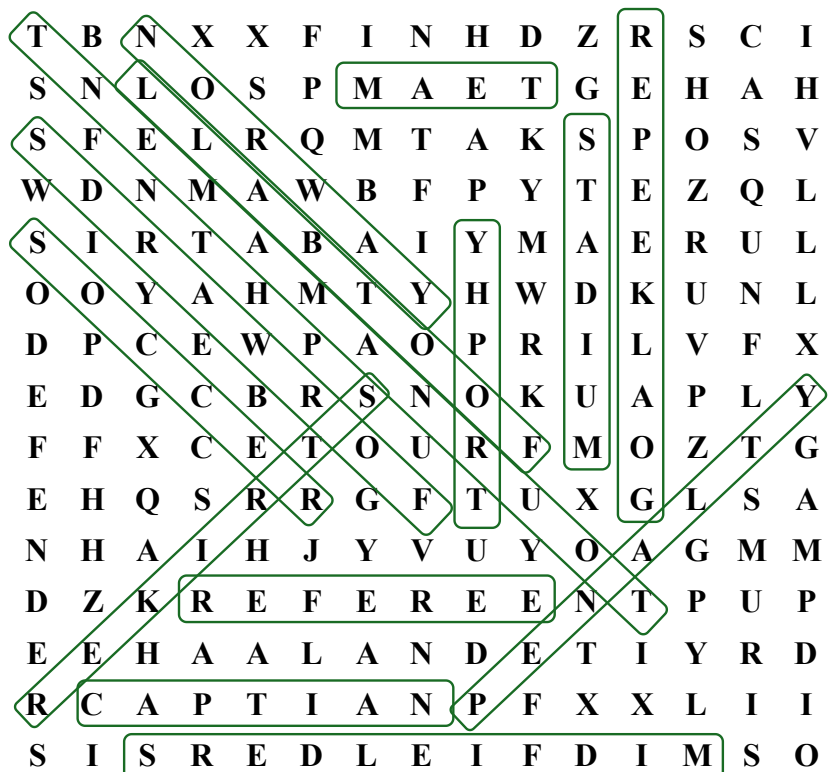

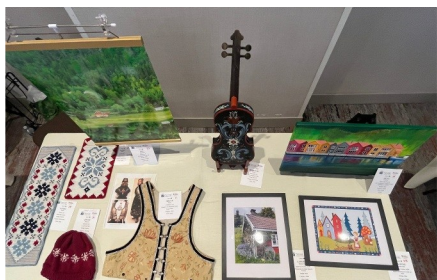
Folk Art Exhibition

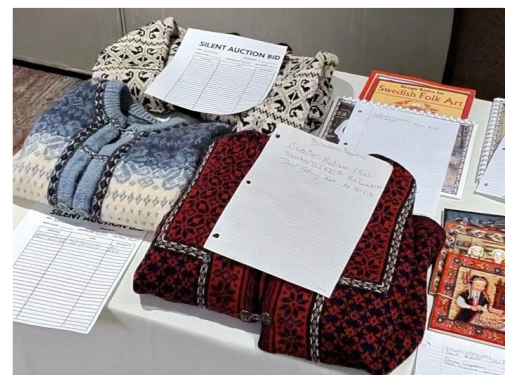


Silent Auction & Giving Back

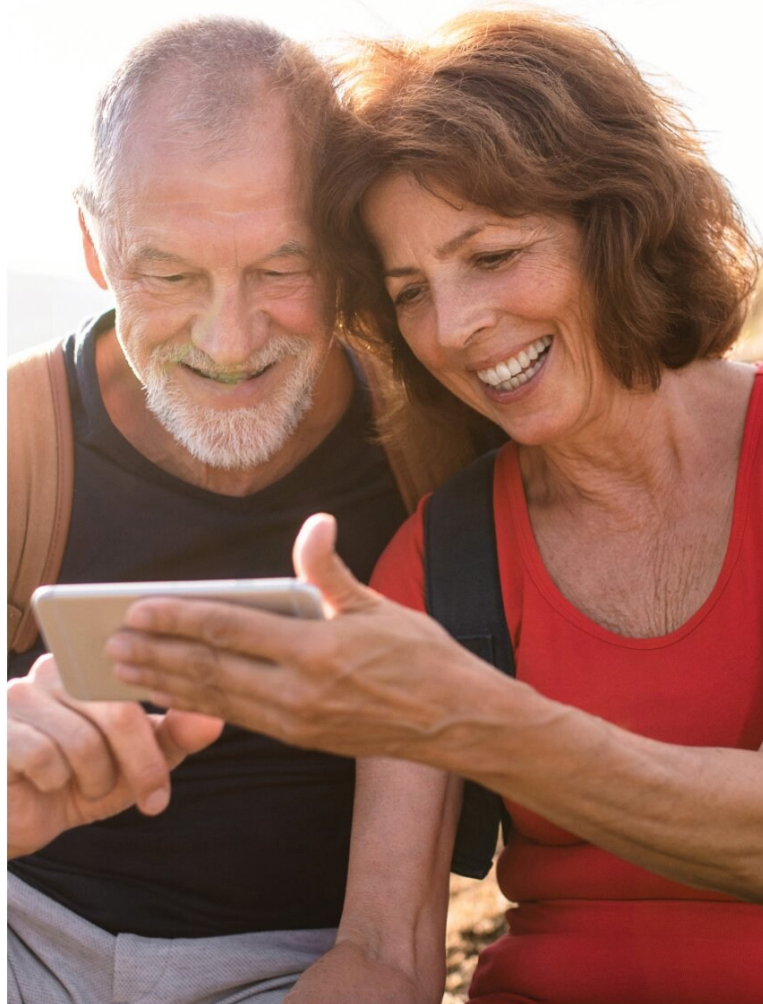

From Football to the Vikings

How Norway's World Cup Success Inspired a Look at Viking Sports

Norway's exciting run to the 2026 FIFA World Cup quarterfinals introduced millions of fans to superstar striker Erling Braut Haaland. His remarkable journey from Bryne, Norway, to becoming one of the world's top footballers has inspired a new generation of Norwegian players and fans.

Watching Norway's success got me wondering, did the Vikings play sports?

The answer is yes—but not anything quite like modern soccer. The Viking game that most closely resembled today's field sports was knattleikr (pronounced *ka-not-lay-kr*). Mentioned in several Icelandic sagas, it was a fast-paced stick-and-ball game with similarities to Irish hurling, a traditional field sport still played throughout Ireland, combining elements of lacrosse, field hockey, baseball, and rugby.

Descriptions from the sagas tell us that knattleikr:

- Was played by teams led by captains.
- Used a hard ball and sticks, although players sometimes used their hands.
- Was highly physical, with body-checking and injuries being common.
- Was often played on frozen ground or ice.
- Could last from morning until evening.
- Frequently attracted large crowds of spectators.

While we don't know all of the rules, we do know that Viking sports reflected the skills needed for everyday life. Wrestling, swimming, archery, horse games, and knattleikr all emphasized strength, endurance, teamwork, and agility—qualities that helped prepare Vikings for the challenges they faced both at home and on their voyages.

Perhaps the games have changed over the centuries, but one thing remains the same: Norwegians have always valued competition, teamwork, and the thrill of cheering on their champions.

A Brand-New World Cup Tradition!

One of the biggest surprises of the 2026 World Cup wasn't a goal, it was the fans!

Norwegian supporters created a brand-new celebration called the Viking Row, inspired by Norway's Viking long-ships. It begins with the blast of a traditional Norse horn before everyone sits in long rows, like the crew of a Viking ship. A leader beats a drum, slowly at first and then faster and faster, while the fans row their arms together and chant, "Ro!" ("Row!" in Norwegian).

The Viking Row quickly became one of the tournament's biggest fan attractions. Norwegian supporters performed it in stadiums, airports, hotels, city streets, and even New York's Times Square. By the time the World Cup Final arrived, the celebration had become so popular that Animal, the wild drummer from The Muppets, led the whole world in a giant Viking Row during the halftime show.

Can you try the Viking Row with your friends? Sit in a line, grab your imaginary oars, and shout "Ro!" as you row your Viking ship to victory!

How to Do the Viking Row

- Sit on the ground or in your seats in long rows, one person directly behind the other.
- A leader or drummer sets a slow rhythm.
- As the drumbeats, reach both arms straight forward, lean your torso back, pull your arms in toward your chest as if pulling an oar, and lean forward.
- Every time you pull back on the imaginary oar, shout "Ro!" in unison with the group.

The drummer and the chant will progressively speed up. Keep up the rhythm until the tempo peaks, at which point everyone jumps up together into a massive, triumphant roar!



Norway Takes the World Stage!

Every four years, the world's best soccer teams compete in the FIFA World Cup. (Outside the United States, most people call the sport football!) In 2026, 48 countries traveled to North America to compete in the biggest sporting event on Earth. More than a billion people around the world were expected to watch the championship match.

Norway has a proud soccer tradition. The Norwegian women's national team is one of the most successful teams in the world. They have won the FIFA Women's World Cup, a European Championship, and an Olympic gold medal—an achievement no other Nordic country has matched.

The Norwegian men's national team made history at the 2026 World Cup. In one of the tournament's biggest upsets, Norway defeated five-time World Cup champion Brazil 2–1 in the Round of 16. Erling Haaland scored both goals to send Norway to its first-ever World Cup quarterfinal. There, Norway battled England in a thrilling match that remained tied until overtime before England claimed a 2–1 victory. Although their World Cup journey came to an end, Norway's historic run, determination, and exciting style of play earned the admiration of soccer fans around the world.



Meet Erling Haaland

One of Norway's biggest stars is Erling Haaland, one of the world's most exciting goal scorers. His father, Alf-Inge ("Alfie") Haaland, played for Norway in the 1994 FIFA World Cup—the last time Norway appeared in the tournament before 2026.

Erling wasn't the only player following in his father's footsteps. Teammates Alexander Sørloth and Kristian Thorstvedt also had fathers who represented Norway at the 1994 World Cup. Their fathers—Alf-Inge Haaland, Gøran Sørloth, and Erik Thorstvedt—played together in the United States, and 32 years later, their sons helped lead Norway on its historic run to the quarterfinals.

Erling has already broken several scoring records in professional soccer and is known for his speed, strength,

and powerful shots. Fans around the world were excited to watch him lead Norway back onto the World Cup stage.

Whether it's talented players, enthusiastic fans, or the thunderous sound of the Viking Row, Norway reminds us that teamwork, determination, and national pride can make the world's biggest tournament even more exciting.
